Hard Times

In spite of the many good things that have happened, this has been a really tough year so far. We will never forget 2008. The political unrest in Kenya has been stressful. Our dorm girls had many difficult things happen in their families as well – an airplane crash, a beating in Sudan that almost took the lives of one of our girl's parents, car accidents, traveling into difficult areas of Africa, and even a broken family. Our staff experienced many tough things as well and some even had to return mid-school year back to North America to deal with extended family issues. Most recently we attended the funeral of a wonderful twenty year old young man who had been in Todd's classes and graduated from RVA two years ago. He came out for his younger brother's graduation and died two days later from an infection that reached his heart. It was an incredibly difficult time for all of us. It has also been difficult to see the effects of the world wide increase in food costs here in Kenya. Many people are desperate and we have seen an increase in crime. Peter, the Kenyan man who works on our dorm grounds has been struggling to buy staples in spite of his steady income that he receives from us. He has a wife and four children. We have been helping him with extra money, food, and school fees but we do not want to give too much and make them a target for thieves as well.

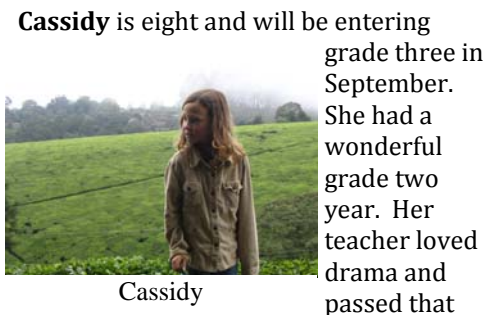
